Concentration (Optional):

Students majoring in Anthropology may select one of the following concentrations in their coursework outside Anthropology (optional):

1. Social Sciences: Departments of Sociology, Political Science, Economics, and Psychology.
2. Arts and Humanities: Departments of Visual Arts and Art History, Communication, English, History, Languages, Linguistics and Comparative Literature, Music, Philosophy, and Theatre.
3. Earth Sciences: Departments of Geography and Geology, and Physics.
4. Natural Sciences: Departments of Biology and Chemistry.
5. Interdisciplinary: Courses from any of the above

At least 12 credit hours are required for the concentration. These courses must be at the 3000 level or above. Minors or double majors are one way of satisfying this requirement. This concentration should complement the student's area of interest in Archaeology, Biological Anthropology, or Sociocultural Anthropology and must be approved by the student's departmental advisor.

Free Electives:

The remaining credit hours of upper-division work are defined as free electives. Students are advised to select courses relevant to their interests in Anthropology. STA 2023 (Introduction to Statistics) is recommended for students interested in a quantitative approach to Anthropology
