GRADUATE **ADMISSIONS** The MA program in sociology offers students the opportunity to develop strong research skills through completion of a rigorous course schedule of theory, methods, topic courses, and a thesis project. Students design and implement research projects that meet high scholarly standards and prepare them for PhD programs or applied research positions. Students obtain a deepened understanding of the social world that readies them to be effective citizens and forces for positive social change.

TWO PATHS OF STUDY

There are two paths of study in the program: the generalist option and the specialist option, both of which require 36 credits of graduate coursework.

The generalist option offers students a broad graduate education in sociology that can serve as the basis for a wide array of professional careers in the public and private sector.

The specialist option is designed for students who plan to pursue a doctoral degree in Sociology. This option offers students the opportunity to design and carry out a research project in a particular area of sociological research under the direct mentorship of a faculty member and then write a thesis. Students may apply to be admitted to the specialist option after completing 9 credits in the program.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

CRITERIA

- 1. Students must complete a bachelor's degree.
- **2.** Students must complete and score competitively on the Graduate Record Exam (GRE). GRE scores over five years old will not be accepted.
- **3.** Students must have a minimum 3.0 grade point average for the last 60 credits of undergraduate work leading to their bachelor's degree.
- **4.** Students must submit directly to the Department of Sociology:
- a) Statement of Purpose (500 to 1000 words in length, outlining their goals and interests in subject areas within sociology)
- b) A sample of their writing (e.g., a paper from an undergraduate course).
- **5.** Sociology majors at FAU should submit the names of two sociology faculty members as their referees. All other students must obtain two letters of recommendation and have them sent by the recommenders directly to the Department of Sociology.
- **6.** Applicants who apply after March 1 (for Fall admission) or after November 1 (for Spring admission) may be admitted to the graduate program but may be too late to be considered for an assistantship award.

GRADUATE TEACHING ASSISTANTSHIPS

The Department of Sociology offers graduate teaching assistantships (GTAs) to outstanding students.

These assistantships provide students with a full tuition waiver (for three classes per term) plus a stipend of \$4000 per term in return for their work as assistants to the faculty. If the student's work in both the assistantship and the graduate program is satisfactory, the assistantship is continued for the four terms necessary to complete the degree.

Students who are awarded a GTA have the opportunity to work closely with the faculty on their courses and make a significant contribution to the quality of the courses offered to both lower and upper division students.

A GTA is deeply involved in the life of the department since the position requires full-time enrollment and about twenty hours per week of grading, tutoring, and other assistance to the faculty. The Department provides GTAs with a dedicated workspace in the Culture and Society building on the Boca Raton campus.
