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Cristobal Salinas, Jr., Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Educational Leadership and Research Methodology, in Florida Atlantic University (FAU)'s College of Education, engages in critical scholarship that promotes discovery, integration, application and teaching. He was selected by FAU as the Scholar of the Year at the Assistant Professor level in 2019.

FACULTY FOCUS: SALINAS

Cristobal Salinas, Jr., Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Educational Leadership and Research Methodology, who joined Florida Atlantic University (FAU)'s College of Education in 2015, has accelerated in publishing scholarly research. To date, he has published 14 refereed journal articles, edited three books and volumes and wrote more than 20 refereed book/monograph chapters, in addition to editorial articles and research briefs. He has given refereed presentations internationally, nationally, and regionally. Through qualitative methodologies, his research focuses on issues of access and equality in higher education and explores the economic, social, and political contexts of educational opportunities for historically marginalized communities.

Due to his productivity and research impact, FAU selected Salinas as Scholar of the Year at the Assistant Professor level in 2019 during FAU's 50th Honors Convocation. In 2019, Salinas also was awarded the Equity and Social Justice Scholar Award during the National Conference on Race and Ethnicity in American Education and the 2018-2019 Vice President's Diamond Award/Faculty from the Division of Student Affairs at FAU. Other awards include being named Honorary Faculty, Chi Sigma Alpha Student Affairs Honor Society International in 2016 and Faculty Fellow by Peace, Justice, and Human Rights Initiative in 2015.

As chair of the Faculty Advisory Committee and Coordinator for the Leadership Studies Minor, Salinas advises and mentors instructors and supervises the curriculum of courses. From fall 2015 to summer 2019, Salinas oversaw 121 course sections in which 1,727 students have enrolled in one or more courses. Since spring 2016, Salinas has supervised 64 capstone projects through which students have volunteered more than 3,500 hours of community service. More than 40 students have graduated with this minor, which is offered across five academic colleges. In fall 2019, 37 undergraduate students were enrolled in the Leadership Studies Minor.

Salinas has served as dissertation chair, co-chair and committee member for ELRM. Presently he serves on the Outstanding Dissertation of the Year committee and Library committee at the department level, on the Undergraduate Programs Committee at the college level and the Office of Undergraduate Research & Inquiry as a faculty mentor and on the University Diversity Committee as a member at the university level.

In 2016, Salinas was invited by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to participate on a panel for the Hispanic Serving Institutions Grant Program. Salinas is the founder and Editor-in-Chief of *Journal Committed to Social Change on Race and Ethnicity (JCSCORE)*. He serves as an editorial board reviewer and social media editor for the *Community College Journal of Research and Practice (CCJRP)*.

Salinas earned a Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration in 2015 and a M.Ed. in Student Affairs and Higher Education in 2012 from Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa. He graduated from the University of Nebraska at Kearney, Kearney, Neb. with a B.A. in Spanish Education, English as a Second Language and Dance in 2010.

ELRM FACULTY PROMOTE RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

Research Methodology is the foundation for conducting research.

The Research Methodology area of the Department of Educational Leadership and Research Methodology (ELRM) and its related courses, provides education and support for educational research methods. Its main goal is to:

- educate students with the specialized knowledge and competencies required by learners from a variety of disciplines, and
- provide methodological expertise in support of faculty and doctoral students to enhance teaching, learning and scholarship.

In fact, undergraduate courses in educational measurement and evaluation and graduate courses, such as educational research, educational measurement and educational statistics, support graduate degrees offered by all six departments in the College of Education.

FAU EGYPT PARTNERSHIP FORGES PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT PATH

To advance social mobility opportunities for lower middle class families in Egypt, the Florida Atlantic University (FAU) Egypt Partnership offers professional development for public school teachers. Faculty in the Department of Educational Leadership and Research Methodology (ELRM) along with faculty from the Department of Curriculum, Culture, and Educational Inquiry (CCEI), created curriculum to prepare private school teacher leaders, who would, in turn, facilitate professional development in experimental Egyptian public schools to improve student learning by building teacher capacity using a teacher-of-teacher model.

"During the four years of the partnership, quality professional development opportunities were afforded to 10,000 Egyptian public school teachers," said Maysaa Barakat, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, ELRM, who initiated this project in 2015 when ELRM joined Balanced Education, Cairo Egypt, to form a partnership. She continues to coordinate the partnership under the direction of Robert Shockley, Ph.D., Chair and Professor, ELRM, and Daniel Reyes-Guerra, Ph.D., Associate Professor and School Leaders Program Coordinator, ELRM.

As a result of the FAU Egypt Partnership, "cross cultural learning and exchange of expertise was possible between FAU faculty and Egyptian educators," noted Barakat. To date, these Egyptian teachers used the knowledge and skills they learned in the professional development program to provide quality education to more than 464,600 Egyptian students.

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bestowed at the 49th Honors Convocation, gave three examples that showed how research based effective practices have been replaced with untested mandated policies with reduced impact, leaving researchers with challenges in the social, political and administrative contexts rather than the research process.

Danesh presented research studies suggesting that some of the variance of tinnitus, sensation of sound(s) without any external acoustic source, and hyperacusis, intolerance of everyday sounds, is explained by psychological factors. Danesh's research revealed that parental mental illness significantly increased the risk of anxiety and depression. Danesh's research on tinnitus and hyperacusis is a collaborative work with scientists from Europe, including the United Kingdom and Germany.

Dukes presented research that addressed the benefits that participants gain from being involved in experimental research. He gave three examples of how individuals with Autism Spectrum



"Faculty expertise covers a wide range of areas in the field of leadership, including policy, school leadership practices, organizational development, community education, research methodology and higher education leadership," Shockley stated. The department consists of four distinct academic areas:



ELRM also oversees several partnership programs, which deliver district specific professional development for school leaders taught by seasoned leaders within that particular school district. These include Educational Leadership: Intern to Excellence (ELITE) for St. Lucie, Martin and Okeechobee County School Districts; School Leaders for Excellence and Equity (EXEQ) for the School District of Palm Beach County; and Principal Rapid Orientation and Preparation in Educational Leadership (PROPEL) for Broward County Public Schools.

For undergraduate students, ELRM offers a <u>Leadership Studies Minor</u>, a 16-credit interdisciplinary program that deepens students' understanding of leadership. For those who hold a bachelor's or master's degree and teaching certification, ELRM jointly offers a <u>Teacher Leadership Certificate</u> with the Department of Curriculum, Culture, and Educational Inquiry.

The internationally recognized <u>Office of Appreciative Education</u>, which includes the Appreciative Advising Institute, is also under ELRM's purview. Appreciative Education is a framework for creating a culture with high standards that embraces ongoing learning, change and improvement on both an individual and an organizational level.

Q & A: CLINICAL EXPERIENCES

Undergraduate and graduate degrees that lead to eligibility for teacher certification upon completion of the programs require practicums, field experiences and student teaching. Here are some common questions and answers on this topic from the Office for Academic and Student Services (OASS):

How do students apply for placement in field experiences and practicums?

All placements must be arranged via OASS. Students in teacher preparation programs need to apply for placement and submit evidence of security clearance each semester to OASS by Nov. 1 for fall, March 1 for spring and June 1 for summer.

How do students apply for student teaching?

Students in teacher preparation programs who meet qualifications for student teaching need to complete the online application and submit a copy of passing Florida Teacher Certification Exam (FTCE) (subject area AND professional

education) scores or evidence of test registration date to any OASS office by Jan 31 for fall and Sept. 15 for spring. Passing scores must be submitted by March 31 for fall and Nov. 15 for spring.

Where and when can students receive FTCE General Knowledge (GK) test preparation for the math and verbal sections?

Florida Atlantic University offers GK Test
Preparation for the Math and Verbal sections.
Each review includes 15 hours of classroom instruction.

Where do students register to take the Florida Teacher Certification Exam (FTCE)?

To register for the FTCE General Knowledge (GK) test, FTCE Professional Education test (PEd), or the FTCE Subject Area Examinations (SAE), register online at http://www.fl.nesinc.com/
