FAU Catalog description:

Syntax (LIN 6520) 3 credits Graduate introduction to syntax. Sentence structure, typology, syntactic theory, and the application of theory to data analysis.

Course description:

This course is an introduction to the study of sentence structure, data analysis, and syntactic argumentation. We will study syntactic commonalities and diversity across languages in order to understand more about the mental grammar (and ultimately the brain/mind).

Goals of the course:

The goals of the course include:

- learning about contemporary syntactic theory
- · learning how to analyze syntax datasets in a variety of languages
- · learning linguistic-specific argumentation

Grading distribution:

The final course grade will be calculated as follows:

Final Project:

50% (Proposal 15%; Presentation 15%; Final paper 25%)

Assignments:

40% (5 total: 10% each; drop lowest)

Attendance & participation: 10%

Assignments:

There will be 5 assignments throughout the semester due in class or online via Canvas. I will post assignments 1 week before the due date. They may be done in groups of maximum 3 students, but each student must: (1) Turn in a separate assignment which s/he wrote/typed up individually, and (2) list the student(s) that s/he worked with. Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the due date (i.e. at 14:00). Please keep a copy of each finished assignment in case the submitted copy is accidentally lost.

Final Project:

Each student will select a topic related to the course material and in consultation with the professor. This project will consist of (i) a Project Proposal (FP prop.; 10%), (ii) an oral presentation (15%), and final paper (25%). The oral presentation will occur in class time. The final paper will be due in the exam period and will no more than 10 pages (single spaced).

Late submissions:

Late submissions will not be accepted unless you have a documented medical excuse. If you miss an assignment deadline, and you have a certified medical excuse, you must notify me (via email) within 24 hours of the assignment deadline.

Grading scale:

Quiz scores and attendance & participation credit will be calculated as percentages. There will be **no rounding of grades** beyond the automatic rounding done by Canvas. At the end of the semester, the overall percentage score will be converted into a letter grade as follows:
