Course Description:

This course introduces critical gender and sexuality studies, including Queer Theory, considering the relations between the history of sexuality and the politics of gender.

Please be forewarned: readings in this course are particularly dense and some readings will contain explicit erotic material. If you have any objections to explicit sexual material please speak with me about accommodations immediately.

Course Objectives/ Learning Outcomes:

- 1. To develop advanced critical thinking, research and writing skills
- To explore some of the major debates about gender and sexuality and to understand the central theories underpinning them.

Contextual Reports: Each of you will present one or more contextual reports for the authors and topics of this class. Your report should be around 1-2 minutes long and should provide the class with background and/or biographical information about your topic. You should be able to find what you need on Wikipedia. You do not need to provide a copy of this material to me.

Response Papers: You will complete two response papers for this class. Response papers should register your response to the readings: your confusions and questions, connections you see with other readings, interesting or anomalous moments, and so on. You may choose to respond to the readings as a whole or you may engage one particular reading. Response papers should be 1-2 pages (double-spaced) and should be printed and brought to class. I may ask you to share your responses to initiate class discussion. Responses will be graded based on level of engagement and issues of language, grammar, and MLA. All quotations must include citations and the response paper should include a properly formatted Works Cited page.

Book Reviews: PhD students will complete book reviews for Gender Trouble and their additional reading. These students should meet with me for more information on the expectations of this assignment.

Bibliography: We're really only skimming the surface of Queer Theory in this class. For your bibliography you should select a topic or author from the class and compile a bibliography of at least 10 sources. You may wish to focus your bibliography on the topic for your seminar paper. Bibliographies should be emailed to me and *must* be in *absolutely correct* MLA format.

Paper Proposal: You will write a proposal for your final paper in order to practice this academic genre and in order to receive feedback from me before completing the final paper. The proposal will be 2-3 pages and should describe the topic / problem you will pursue as well as the theoretical tools you plan on using. It will include a bibliography in correct MLA format, which may be a revised version of the bibliography already completed and which does not count in the 2-3 page total for the proposal.

Seminar Paper: The bulk of your grade will be determined by a seminar paper of 17-20 pages on a topic of your choosing. The paper must engage one or more theories read in the class. If you wish to work with other theories from this field, please speak with me first. This paper should be emailed to me in .doc, .docx, or .rtf format only.
