Course Description:

The Learning Community Experience combines student academic learning in and out of the classroom through activities, both related to your success in your courses and as an FAU student overall. Based on *Student Development Theory*, you will participate in a variety of programs, workshops and events, and reflect upon their relevance toward enhancing your FAU experience.

Credit Hours: 0

Course Objectives: Upon completion, the students will:

- Reflect upon a variety of experiences and how they impact their college experience and the experiences of others
- Develop a deeper sense of connection to their university community through involvement and advocacy and understanding of others
- Learn from networking opportunities within the community
- Enhance oral, written, or other communication skills through participation in a variety of opportunities for presentation and dialogue.
- Gain experience in developing analytical, critical and/or practical skills as related to critical thinking through a variety of experiences developed by the LC planning committees specific to the LC discipline or theme.

Learning Outcomes:

- 1) You will be able to identify at least three techniques which you are utilizing that are helping you to gain success in your FAU experience this fall.
- 2) You will discover and utilize two academic and/or co-curricular opportunities available to you on campus.
- 3) You will be able to identify people and resources on campus who will support you in your success.

Course Requirements:

- Students will be required to participate in programs, discussions, workshops and/or study groups as offered.
- Students will reflect on their experiences by answering the reflection questions on Canvas.

Required Text: Articles related to first-year college student success will be provided and discussed.

Assessment:

Students will be graded on a Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (Pass/Fail) basis. The grade will be determined by *participation and attendance* (see attendance policy) at class meetings and other programs/events/study groups. The grade in this course will not affect your GPA; however, it will appear on your transcript.

Attendance:

Students must attend/complete a maximum of 11 activity/events worth 5-10 points each and complete the reflection quiz in order to meet the core requirements of this course. Students must earn at least 73 points to earn a satisfactory "S" grade in this course.

Participation:

Students are expected to actively participate in class through attending on-campus events and completing an online submission of event attendance and reflection through Canvas.

Any submissions after this date and time will be automatically denied.
- Students are responsible for keeping track of their own submissions.

Instructions and SLS 1412 Policies for LC Students

SLS 1412 is a class to make sure students get involved and connected to FAU! It is a fun class, where students get to earn their grade how they want! The class is built on a point system where each activity/event completed is worth 5-10 points. In order to receive a Satisfactory (S), you must earn 73 points based on the guidelines below.

Learning Community Specific Event Requirement:

SLS 1412 is on their schedule every Tuesday at 4pm but only attend on the dates listed below. In addition, in the beginning of the semester, you will participate in either the RLC Early Move-In or the CCLC Ice Cream Social. During the fall semester there will be 3 MANDATORY events sponsored by the Learning Community program that students are required to attend on <u>Tuesdays at 4pm (9/4, 10/2, 11/13)</u>. In addition, there will be a Syllabus Quiz due on Friday, August 24th. Completion of all these events/activities count towards a maximum of 40 points of your total grade. Category

Additional Requirements:

Students will need to complete the remaining requirements by attending activities or events that they are interested in on their own time. Each activity/event attended and approved reflection quiz will receive a maximum of 10 points per event/activity. You have a maximum of 60 points from this section. See below for the specific requirements. A weekly calendar will be provided to inform students about on-campus events to to fulfill the class requirements.

All Experiences/ events will be submitted through Canvas. This program is used for all Academic Coursework throughout FAU. Students will be using this program frequently to submit all events/experiences for The Learning Community Experience: SLS 1412 course.
