Credit Hours: 1

Course Objectives: Upon completion, you will:

- 1. Utilize critical thinking to determine the nature and extent of information needed to investigate a question, solve a problem, and/or complete a project.
- 2. Identify, evaluate, and formulate research questions.
- 3. Explore what research, scholarship, or creative activity look like in your fields of interest.
- 4. Identify curricular and co-curricular learning opportunities that build relationships, skills, or knowledge and contribute to academic and career success.
- 5. Research majors, evaluating how they fit with your intellectual interests, career aspirations, and personal values.
- 6. Communicate your ideas through oral or written work as measured by selection of appropriate topics and sources; organization of the presentation or paper; persuasive argumentation; and adaptation to the audience, setting, and occasion.

Course Requirements:

Students will be required to complete all required course assignments provided by their instructor.

Required Text: All instructional materials are available through the instructor and/or Canvas.

Assessment:

Students will be graded on a Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory basis. The grade will be determined by completion of modules within Canvas and completion of all included assignments in addition to the successful completion of the SLS 1410: FAU iSucceed course.
