COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to the fundamental components of small unmanned aerial systems (sUAS) and how they are used to produce high resolution, spatially accurate, planimetric maps and 3-D models of the terrain. Students will also learn how to design and build a sUAS platform with basic camera sensors and learn the regulations of operating a sUAS required by FAA (Federal Aviation Administration).

This is a research-intensive (RI) course and an Academic Service Learning (AS-L) course.

This course contains multiple assignments designed to help students conduct research and inquiry at an intensive level. If this class is selected to participate in the university-wide assessment program, students will be asked to complete a consent form and submit electronically some of their research assignments for review. COURSE PREREQUISITES

Prerequisite: None

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will demonstrate:

- A. The ability to understanding theoretical background of UAS Mapping Systems (1)
- B. The ability to operate the UAS Mapping Systems and do basic image processing (1, 3)
- C. The ability to apply a UAS Mapping System in a well-defined project (1,3,4, 5,6)
- D. Ability to acquire and apply new knowledge needed to develop effective design solutions for sUAS applications (7)

COURSE DELIVERY MODE

This course is accessible only through FAU's learning management system, Canvas. You must log into Canvas with your FAU ID and Password to access the materials and assignments in this course. If you do not know your FAU ID or Password, [contact OIT for help](#).

The course delivery mode is mostly online class live lecture using synchronous virtual trainings via Cisco WebEx/Zoom Conferencing on Wednesdays from 7:10pm to 10:00pm, EST each week. You are expected to participate in online active learning sessions during the synchronous virtual trainings.

The course is organized into modules with due dates. Unless otherwise specified, each module begins on Monday at 12:00am, EST, and ends on Sunday at 11:59pm, EST. This course has 3 credit hours. For traditionally delivered courses, not less than one (1) hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction each week for fifteen (15) weeks per Fall or Spring semester, and a minimum of two (2) hours of out-of-class student work for each credit hour. Equivalent time and effort are required for Summer Semesters, which usually have a shortened timeframe. Fully Online courses, hybrid, shortened, intensive format courses, and other non-traditional modes of delivery will demonstrate equivalent time and effort.

COURSE ASSESSMENTS, ASSIGNMENTS & GRADING POLICY

GRADING CRITERIA

Class Assignments, Homework, Discussion Boards (20%)

Reflection assignment counts toward the class assignments grade.

Design Project (40%)

The course requires participation in a team research academic service learning project that involves collaborating with other students to produce a final product. This assignment offers you the opportunity to practice virtual collaboration skills that are applicable to the 21st Century global workforce. Though group work is often challenging, it is a reality in nearly every employment setting. Learning to be a supportive team member, resolve conflicts, and discover your role preferences within group projects is an important part of the skills you will develop through your FAU education.

The project is scaffolded in progress report milestone deliverables. The interim deliverables are scored using a rubric, and a jury of professionals is invited to give feedback. The final report document is due near the end of the semester. The final report is assessed using a rubric.

Midterm (15%) and Final Exam (20%)

There is a midterm and final exam based on readings, lectures, homework, and class discussions. Answers will be evaluated based on content in terms of accuracy of information and ability to analyze the issues. Exams will be taken online in the Canvas Learning Management System using Lockdown Browser/Respondus Monitor. Tests will be timed. No make-up exams are given.

Class Participation (5%)

You are expected to participate in all synchronous class sessions with a smile and keep up with the material. You are not expected to be a distraction in the class. Final grades will be reduced by one letter grade for lack of participation in more than three (3) live lecture sessions or for any other form of class disruption (as determined by the instructor).

The instructor will calculate your grade based on the following weighted distribution:
