<p>Please explain the requested change(s) and offer rationale below or on an attachment</p> <p>The PJHR Certificate program is being converted to a minor and certificate program:</p> <p>1) This constitutes an update to the existing Peace, Justice, and Human Rights (PJHR) Certificate. The update includes the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The certificate will be reduced from 15 credits to 12 credits; the elimination of "contexts" courses, which are now designated as electives; and the addition of courses to the core and elective choices <p>Rationale: The reduction in credits expedites student completion of the certificate and aligns PJHR certificate requirements with typical certificate/minor credit requirements across the university. Elimination of "contexts" courses so that students now select only between core and electives streamlines the process for advisers and students. The course list has been updated to reflect current course offerings.</p> <p>2) We wish to add the option for students to obtain a minor in Peace, Justice, and Human Rights (PJHR). The requirements of the minor will be the same as the PJHR certificate: completion of 12 credits (6 credits core courses & 6 credits elective courses)</p> <p>Rationale: The minor will be an appropriate option for degree seeking students. Currently, PJHR offers only an undergraduate certificate. Financial aid will cover certificate courses only if those courses also apply to students' major. However, financial aid will cover courses that count toward a minor. By offering a minor, PJHR can serve more degree seeking students who are on financial aid. We will also retain our certificate to continue serving non-degree seeking students.</p>

Peace, Justice, and Human Rights Minor/Certificate/Minor

The Peace, Justice, and Human Rights (PJHR) minor-certificate is designed to provide an enriching educational experience for degree-seeking and non-degree-seeking students interested in themes of peace, social justice, and human rights. The minor-certificate has a tailored curriculum that allows students flexibility to design a program matching their personal interests and their academic and professional objectives. Graduates enter fields such as law, international relations, social and community work and education.

Minimum Requirements for Minors: A stand-alone minor must fulfill the following minimum standards:

1. 12 credit hours of work in the area of the minor.
2. 9 (of the 12 or more credit hours) must be at the upper level.
3. At least 75 percent of all credits required for the minor must be completed at FAU.
4. Students completing the minor must have a minimum overall FAU grade point average of 2.0 within the coursework required.

Students who are non-degree seeking may complete the Peace, Justice, and Human Rights (PJHR) minor-certificate, which has the same requirements and offers the same tailored curriculum as the minor.

Students are required to complete 12-15 credits from the two-three categories of classes listed below. No more than 6 credits may be taken from any one department. _____
