#### Course Description

In this course, students will be introduced to the nature of philosophy, philosophical thinking, major intellectual movements in the history of philosophy, including topics from the western philosophical tradition, and various problems in philosophy. Students will strengthen their intellectual skills, become more effective learners, and develop broad foundational knowledge.

Student Learning Outcomes: Students fulfilling the Humanities requirement will be able to:

- Reflect critically on the human condition.
- Demonstrate the theory or methods behind forms of human expression.

### **Course Ojbectives:**

- 1. Students will develop critical thinking skills.
- 2. Students will demonstrate an understanding of classical western philosophical views.
- 3. Students will analyze, explain, and evaluate foundational concepts of epistemology, metaphysics, and ethics.

#### **Honors Course:**

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to both the methodology of, and some of the problems addressed by, the discipline of philosophy. One of the objectives of this course is to facilitate critical thinking and debate. Therefore, disagreement is not only anticipated, but encouraged. In this course, the professor, as well as the students, thus may articulate positions and make statements for the purpose of accomplishing this objective that, at times, may not necessarily reflect their personal beliefs on the subject matter. Students will write extensively.

**Required Readings:** All of the required readings are available on the Canvas site for this course. You do not need to purchase any materials for this class.
