The meeting was called to order at 10:01 a.m.

I. APPROVAL OF MINUTES AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

After welcoming the members and guests, Chair Jerry Haky asked for review/approval of the Committee's minutes from its last meeting, December 7, 2020. **The UUPC approved the minutes as written.** Chair Haky's only announcement was to remind representatives to attend the Senate meeting that afternoon if they have items on the agenda and to attend the Steering meeting on February 18, 2021, if they have items being approved at today's meeting. Chair Haky mentioned that Steering had questions on two items from the December 7, 2020, meeting but there was no one in attendance to address those questions, a problem he does not wish to have repeated.

II. OLD BUSINESS

1. Social Work and Criminal Justice

Guest Seth Fallik discussed the program changes in Criminal Justice, which had been postponed from the previous meeting. Suggestions from Committee members and others have now been incorporated into the revised presentation, which includes permitting CCJ 2002 to be counted toward the degree, eliminating the upper limit of 42 credits for the degree, and allowing elective course toward the major to be passed with a minimum grade of "C-." Guest Fallik added that these changes help FAU's Criminal Justice program align more closely with other SUS universities. **The UUPC approved these changes.**

The new course, CCJ 4072, still needed input from other entities, Guest Fallik explained. **The UUPC postponed consideration of this course until the next meeting.** Chair Haky added that next meeting will be the course's final opportunity for approval as it has been postponed several times. If not approved at the next meeting, the course must be withdrawn.

III. NEW BUSINESS

1. University-Wide

Fast-Track Process for RI Courses

Guest Donna Chamely-Wiik presented the rationale behind extending the original deadline for the RI Fast-Track process from spring 2021 to spring 2022. She said that the pandemic delayed faculty and college efforts to optimize the Fast-Track process. The objective remains the same: to increase the number of RI-designated courses and reduce the number of steps prior to submitting the RI-labeled

courses to the UFS. The UUPC approved the extension of the Fast-Track deadline to run through spring 2022.

Freshman Programs

Guest Carole Pfeffer-Lachs outlined the changes proposed in the SLS course: changing the title to align more closely with the program's title, the grading from 0 to 1 credit, and the prerequisites and description of the course. There were 500 students in the pilot program last year, and Guest Pfeffer-Lachs expects 700-900 to register in fall of 2021. She added that colleges are now creating the curriculum for the course, giving it a more targeted focus. Chair Haky asked about the credit change requiring students to now pay for 1 credit. Guest Pfeffer-Lachs explained that this course replaces a 2-credit course; therefore, students now only pay for 1 credit. **The UUPC approved the course changes.**

Air Force ROTC Studies

Undergraduate Studies Dean Ed Pratt explained that this program is located at the University of Miami, but several FAU students are registered in it. Changes to the titles and descriptions of eight courses emphasize leadership, team building and effective communication. The course updates are necessary to keep them in line with changes in the program. **The UUPC approved the course changes.**

Inactive Courses

Registrar Brian Hodge traced the history of the process approved by Faculty Senate in February of 2020 to consider deleting inactive courses from FAU's course inventory, and shared the mandate by the state for SUS institutions to keep their course inventories clean. If a course has not been scheduled in the past five years, perhaps there is no need to carry it into the future in the Banner system or the University Catalog. Faculty were given an opportunity to consider such courses in their departments throughout the fall, and report their decisions to the Registrar's Office by December. The final Excel spreadsheet shows faculty decisions on many courses; other courses that engendered no responses are also considered to be deleted. This list will be on the consent agenda for the next UFS meeting. **The UUPC approved the termination of courses in the inactive course list.**
